Cumbria In Bloom Results 2016



For the third year running Dalston village has won the National Park Trophy Gold award in the Cumbria in Bloom Best Large Village competition. The trophy was presented by the Mayor of Penrith at the ceremony at The North Lakes Hotel, Penrith on 8th September 2016. Volunteer representatives from the village attended the event and saw slides from around the county to show Schools, Tourism and It's Your Neighbourhood categories.

Amongst the judges remarked were an immaculate bowling green enhanced by beautiful begonia displays and a recently planted perennial border, which added to the





existing shrub structure. They thought we had a unique bridge at the end of the Kingsway. The churchyard was commented on as an excellent example of improving and creating wildlife habitat, the preservation of the Slow Worm area is particularly vigorous. They also mentioned the horticultural and private gardens being of a high standard with enhancing displays by commercial premises.

The Gold award was far from all that Dalston collected. In addition the Parish Council won, on behalf of St Michael's Churchyard Group, the Provincial Insurance trophy for





Churchyards in the Pride in Your Community category. This is a great tribute to all those volunteers and contractors (Wigton Town Council) who work so hard to keep our cemetery and churchyard looking so good.



Dalston Village were winners of the Cumbria County Council Carlisle Local Committee Award for Achievement in the District and joint winners of the Sellafield License Co. trophy for the best large tidy village.

These major awards were supplemented by the Cumbria in Bloom It's Your Neighbourhood Awards as follows - Indian King Court and 4 The Square (level 4 Thriving), Dalston Gardening Club (level 3 Advancing) and Dalston Station Gardeners (level 4 Thriving).

This year we have gained more volunteers and all these awards are proof to them and also the contractors who have worked tirelessly and particularly hard this year to keep Dalston Village looking particularly good. Dalston Parish Council is very grateful to them all.

We thank them for all their attention to detail and much of the credit for this national award should be go Mike.
