Mrs Olive Clarke, OBE, JP, DL

It was with great sorrow that we lost one of our longest serving Patrons Mrs Olive Clarke. In December Cumbria in Bloom wrote an appreciation for the Royal Horticultural Society of Olive's involvement as a friend and part of the 60th anniversary celebrations of Britain in Bloom in 2024. Following the post war initiative in France, the Tourist Board set up a Britain in Bloom Committee in 1963. At the time Olive Clarke was working in London on the National Federation of Women's Institute Committee and was asked to be a founder member of Britain in Bloom and a judge in the South of England and nationally in towns and villages. She has been involved ever since and became a Cumbria in Bloom Patron many years ago.

With the death of Olive Clarke, Cumbria in Bloom has lost not only one of its Patrons, but also its greatest champion and cheerleader. Olive was a fierce supporter of Cumbria in Bloom, attending Award Ceremonies and Annual General Meetings in her capacity as Patron. She spoke with passion and was very loyal to all those entrusted with running the charity. She regularly kept in touch with our President, Chairman and Administrator, usually by telephone, the most recent call coming just a few weeks before her death on 18th December 2023. Our dear friend's enthusiasm for Cumbria in Bloom and Britain in Bloom will not be forgotten. Her words would send us all out determined to do even more for the community. She was small in stature, but had a massive presence and when she spoke, she never needed a microphone – a special lady indeed, who will be missed by many.

Wildlife Data Recording with the Cumbria Biodiversity Recording Centre in Carlisle

Cumbria in Bloom is very conscious of the collapse in biodiversity in recent years. We have to record to know what we have. The CBDC's predecessor, the Natural History Records Bureau, was setup in 1902 in Tullie House Museum. CBDC holds over 2.1 million wildlife records and is the oldest record centre in the Country.

CBDC was officially launched on the 22nd October 2011 at the first Cumbria Wildlife Recorders Conference at Tullie House Museum. As a result, CBDC is both a very young Local Records Centre but also the oldest! CBDC continues to collect biological records, a tradition lasting over a century, for the Centre for Lakeland (Cumbrian) biological records at Tullie House Museum; a tradition unbroken since the time the information was beautifully recorded in a ledger.

Cumbria in Bloom is partnering with CBDC to encourage all our supporters and volunteers to record what they see. This year the Cumbria Data Watch in June will provide you with the incentive to do your bit for wildlife recording in Cumbria. CBDC are asking everyone in Cumbria, resident or visitor to record everything they see in an hour between 27th and 30th June and send the results to CBCD.
