Excitingly, this year we are working with Cumbria in Bloom and the Royal Horticultural Society to help you get water savvy in the garden.

Below are five easy ways you can start saving water in the garden this summer, whilst still keeping your garden bright and blooming:

1. Swap your hose pipe for a watering can

A hose pipe can use enough water to fill 12 baths every hour, and garden sprinklers and hosepipes left running can use between a huge 500 and 1,000 litres of water an hour! So, an easy water-saving swap is simply switching to a watering can to direct water to where it's most needed!

2. Add mulch to save water

Adding mulch, such as wood chip or bark to your beds, not only suppresses weeds and improves the soil, it also helps soil retain water in the summer (up to 75%), helping you to save both water and the environment

3. Reuse your water

This is a super easy one, simply reuse your bathwater, shower water and washing up water to water your houseplants or garden

4. Plant drought resistant plants

With climate change making our summers drier, you can help save water by planting plants such as Cape Daisies and Jerusalem Sage, which can handle drier conditions

5. Install a water butt in the garden

The average roof collects up to 85,000 litres of rain a year, which is enough to fill a water butt 450 times! So, install a water butt and collect all that lovely rainwater to use in the garden!

Even by reducing your water use in the garden by a fraction through these tips this summer, you could have a big impact on water usage and help to fight against the climate crisis!
